

**And now the most important recap of 14 years – the pirate (sometimes general nautical) trivia.**

2010 - Commander of the Queen Anne's Revenge, Edward Teach, died November 22, 1718, and is better known by his pirate nickname which is \_\_\_\_\_.

2011 - In the 1985 movie, The Goonies, what is the name of One-Eyed Willie's Ship?

2012 - In Robert Louis Stevenson's *Treasure Island*, what is the name of the one-legged cook? (Also the name of a restaurant.)

2013 - Mary Read and Anne Bonny are the only two women known to have been convicted of piracy during the early 18<sup>th</sup> century, during what was known as the Golden Age of Piracy. Neither were executed as most of the crew was because of why?

2014 - Pirates will sometimes fly a flag with a skull and crossbones or swords on it. What is the name of that flag?

2015 - Pirates had to make port sometime and they had havens where it was safe for a pirate to go without being arrested. Where was the biggest pirate haven during the golden age of piracy?

2016 - The left and right sides of boats are called the Port and Starboard respectively – what color light appears on the Port side of a boat?

2017 - It was sometimes a fine line between privateer and pirate, this sailor became captain of the ship Blessed William and, I kid-you-not, he also helped build the Trinity Church in New York. This "pirate" was hanged May 23, 1701, in London – interestingly the rope broke and he was hanged a second time. Who was this famous privateer/pirate?

2018 - Each pirate ship had its own set of rules and code. Almost every pirate ship had their own set of guidelines that all pirates had to agree to. This included how the loot would be divided, who had what chores, and what was expected of everyone. What was one of the most common rules? Hint – if two pirates had a disagreement they'd have to wait to do this until they were on land.

2019 - There are many old European sailing superstitions, for example, it is bad luck to change the name of the boat. If you do, you must have a de-naming ceremony and officially christen the boat again. Another superstition, people with this hair color were believed to bring bad luck to a ship. If you met one before boarding, the only way to mitigate the bad luck was to speak to them before they could speak to you. What is the hair color?

2020 - Bartholomew Roberts (17 May 1682 – 10 February 1722) was a Welsh pirate who raided ships off the Americas and West Africa between 1719 and 1722. He was the most successful pirate of the Golden Age of Piracy as measured by vessels captured, taking over 400 prizes in his career. What was Bartholomew actual name at birth?

2021 - Scuttlebutt in slang usage means rumor or gossip, deriving from the nautical term for the \_\_\_\_\_ that was used on ships to contain fresh water.

2023 - To adjust to the light and darkness above and below deck during raids, what might have a pirate worn?
